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
### **Center Shows Off New Look at Grand Reopening Celebration**

### New Procedures Put in Place to Safely Welcome Back Participants

Even though we had to close the doors to our Mountain View day health care facility due to COVID-19, the team at Avenidas Rose Kleiner Center has continued to support our participants and families at home over the last year. We've been offering Zoom classes, social calls, and socially distanced visits throughout the week.

At the same time, our building underwent some major improvements (see pictures). Additionally, our leadership team has been working on putting new processes in place to reopen safely. By the time we reopen in early Summer, all staff and participants who are planning on returning to the center will be fully vaccinated. We are working on our processes for participants to come into the building with health and safety being a top priority.

Participants and staff will wear protective equipment such as masks, and tables will be physically distanced



and have sneeze guards to mitigate any further risk of exposure. When possible, we will provide opportunities for programming on our back courtyard. As our center tends to serve older adults who are more at risk in the community, our team of professionals is eager to work with them in person again to help improve their quality of life (and that of their caregivers!). This year was hard on everyone but especially those who have had limited opportunities to socialize and move around. We are all ready and anxious to open our doors and welcome everyone back!

#### **Aging Connected**

Earlier this year, OATS and the Humana Foundation launched the Aging Connected initiative to bring 1 million older Americans online by 2022. The Aging Connected: Exposing the Hidden Connectivity Crisis for Older Adults report found that almost 22 million seniors don't have internet at home, with Blacks, Latinos and rural Americans being the most internet deprived. # New Workshop Series Boosts Caregivers' Knowledge and Spirits

Given the staggering disruption the pandemic had on the lives of older adults, Avenidas decided to resume the popular Care Forum monthly lecture series from April to September, free of charge to the public. This virtual, interactive 90-minute series features two elder care experts, Dr. Ellen Brown, the former Medical

Director of Pathways, and psychologist Dr. Rita Ghatak, (founder of Aging 1.0.) in conversation with participants to help everyone their health care, through the final months of the pandemic.

Moderated by Avenidas Care Partners
Manager, Paula Wolfson, LCSW, this
series will present a unique opportunity
for our community to share their concerns
and questions with a geriatrician, a
geri-psychologist, and a geriatric social
worker. All three members of the Care
Forum team have over 30 years of experience in direct client clinical services,
hospital, hospice and outpatient care,
community organization, family caregiver
support, counseling, and public speaking.

The Avenidas Care Forum team will provide information and to help family caregivers prepare for medical appointments, emergency admissions to the hospital, and how to hire home care.

Additionally, they will walk through a discharge planning meeting and discuss

relocation to a care community or skilled care facility for rehabilitation, or palliative care and hospice. The featured speakers know the importance of having access to professional and personal support teams, while mediating crucial

conversations with loved ones on legal and financial matters, treatment options.

During these informative sessions, the hosts will hold the chat line open for participants to post questions. Each session will be recorded and posted on the Avenidas web site. You may register for as many of these free sessions as you'd like by visiting
